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INDEXATION CASE DEBATED IN STATE PARLIAMENT

The TASS Executive has been successful in having the case for our indexation debated on the floor of the House of Assembly.

On 20th March, **Nick McKim**, Leader of the Tasmanian Greens, brought on a motion which he had on the notice paper for some time as follows:

- 1 Recognised that RBF defined benefit pensions are effectively being eroded.
- 2 Noted the unsuitability of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) as a cost-of-living index.
- 3 Agreed that changes to RBF superannuation pensions should be made to ensure that the pensions are adjusted bi-annually by the greater of increases in the CPI, increases in the male total average weekly earnings, or increases in the pensioner and beneficiary living cost index.

During the debate he amended the motion by replacing paragraph 3 with a proposal that an actuarial study be conducted into costs of making the proposed improvements; and tabling that study within one month of it being received by the Government. Mr McKim was supported by Minister Cassy O'Connor.

Scott Bacon, Minister for Finance, led the debate for the Government. He maintained that CPI remained an appropriate indexation measure, but he and other Government members voted in favour of the motion to set up an actuarial study.

Peter Gutwein, Shadow Treasurer, spoke on behalf of the Liberal Party and opposed the motion. He stated that in government the Liberal Party would cost any potential changes to RBF pensions and then act appropriately. This position has since been confirmed in a follow-up meeting between two members of the TASS Executive and Mr Gutwein, and also in an exchange of correspondence.

After a lengthy debate Mr McKim's motion was passed with the support of the Greens and Labor members. The TASS Executive hopes to have input into the terms of reference for the actuarial study.

Meanwhile, the Executive has also been aware of events at the Federal level. The retired Australian Defence Force (ADF) personnel, with whom we are affiliated at national level through the Australian Council of Public Sector Retiree Organisations (ACPSRO), have been promised by the Coalition parties that, if they come to Government later this year, they will provide the ADF retirees with indexation justice along the lines that we are seeking. Senator Eric Abetz has confirmed this for us. Senator Carol Brown is also seeking to clarify the Federal Labor Party position. Mr Andrew Wilkie MHR (Independent Member for Denison) has also moved a motion in the House of Representatives that would index ADF pensions by the same method as that used for Age pensions.

During the lead up to the Federal election, the TASS Executive urges members to assist wherever they can by recruiting new members, and lobbying electoral candidates.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

"That the Tasmanian Association of State Superannuants become an incorporated association consistent with the Association Incorporated Act 1964". (The motion was passed); and

"That the revised 2013 Constitution of the Association of State Superannuants, as posted on the Association's website, and as tabled at the 2013 Annual General Meeting, be approved".

(The motion was passed.)

RBF PRESENTATION AT AGM

The TASS executive and members attending the Annual General Meeting were treated to a most informative presentation by Nick Conner, Chief Operations Officer, Retirement Benefits Fund, and Judith Keith, Manager, Products. Here is a brief summary of their presentations:

Nick Connor spoke of the proposed Australian Prudential Regulation Authority (APRA) licensing review to be undertaken by a consulting firm to obtain advice on the options to be considered by the RBF.

He outlined the work being carried out by the Retirement Benefits Fund to improve operational efficiency, including a review of investment mandates and investment managers, and providing cost savings that can be passed onto RBF members. He also detailed the benefits in outsourcing some of RBF's administrative functions to Mercer. Nick spoke about RBF's new insurance product, together with the introduction of unit pricing. He summarised the strong RBF investment returns experienced during 2012.

Judith Keith gave a comprehensive outline of the information required by RBF following the death of a superannuant, including the procedures leading to the payment of superannuation to the surviving spouse/partner.

The definition of a surviving spouse is a spouse who was living with the member on a genuine domestic basis and receiving significant financial support; or was living with the RBF member on a genuine domestic basis; or was not living with the RBF member on a genuine domestic basis, but was receiving significant financial support. Judith emphasised how important it is to keep wills updated; to consider an Enduring Power of Attorney; keep all documents in one place; let people know your plans, and consider financial planning and estate planning advice.

TASS HEALTH

 with Dr Jane Tolman, Director of Aged Care, Department of Health and Human Services

This article from Dr. Jane Tolman is a continuation of the series entitled 'HOW TO AGE WELL'.

FALLS

Approximately 35-45% of healthy community dwelling older people fall over each year, and as there is less reserve in older people, there are often serious consequences.

Falls cause about 40% of nursing home admissions and comprise the fifth leading cause of death

As we age, we become less aware of the various risks - the mat that moves every time we walk on it, dangerous stairs, or the poor spectacles.

Environmental risks are very rarely identified by the elderly. Getting things right at home before we get old is the best solution. Have your home set up for your old age before it happens.

Of all the potential causes, three warrant special attention – weakness at the hips, unstable balance, and taking more than four medications. When there is only one of these present, there is a 12% risk of falling in that year, but when all are present, the risk approaches 100%.

Factors making us prone to fractures with a fall include; being a post-menopausal woman, being under-weight, having a low calcium intake, taking steroid medications (such as prednisolone), or having a previous low trauma fracture – in the case of falling from a standing position.

Reducing the risk of fractures from falls involves attending to a range of issues such as:

- appropriate home modifications (rails, mats, stairs, showers and so on);
- exercise, including balance, strength, reaction time and dynamic stability (Tai Chi is great);
- having the right glasses and footwear and using the correct walking aid when one is recommended;
- reviewing medications (meaning starting some where relevant, such as Vitamin D, calcium and osteoporosis drugs, and stopping others when appropriate, such as sedatives); and
- optimising our physical health-joints, blood pressure, vision and foot care.

TASS COMMENT

HOW DO PRICE RISES AFFECT THE COST OF LIVING FOR RETIREES?

In the year to the 31 December 2012, inflation figures showed that goods and services in Australia rose by 2.2%. In the same time frame, RBF pensions paid to TASS superannuants based on the current CPI, rose by a fraction under 2% per cent. On the surface this doesn't appear to be such a bad outcome, until we take into account other cost increases that we all endure.

Factors that have kept prices relatively stable in Australia in recent years have been the high Australian dollar, which has led to lower costs of imported products such as petrol, along with other imported household goods and the increasing amount of imported foods and goods from low cost producers, China and other Asian countries.

But, look at the larger picture here in Australia where the cost of local goods and services increased by an average of 3.9 % during the year. Of particular concern to retirees was the increase in medical and hospital services which went up by 9.4 %, public transport by 5.7%, insurances 8.5%, and electricity by 7.7%. These are all costs that we cannot avoid if we are to live a reasonably comfortable and healthy lifestyle in retirement. So much for the rising costs of goods and services that we must meet out of our annual budget.

Another factor which has occupied our attention during the past few years has been the dwindling returns on any investments that we may have put aside to subsidise our living costs. Particularly those that have been invested in safer options such as cash or fixed interest, where lower interest earnings have eroded the returns on capital.

Comment has been made in the national media and by politicians in other states about Tasmania being a "mendicant" state of retirees who are a drag on the rest of the Australian economy. This issue, together with the maintenance of Tasmania's share of the national GST distribution, is a key element of concern for Tasmanians in the wake of the coming Federal election. It needs noting that retired people are also significant purchasers of services from local providers (such as from trades people) to maintain their independence of living in their own homes for as long as they can.

The TASS Executive receives comments from members in relation to issues which are of concern to them, and we appreciate that many of our members do share the same concerns of rising living costs, which is why the Tasmanian Association of State Superannuants continues to campaign for a more equitable form of indexation for our Superannuation pensions.

TASS PEOPLE

TASS secretary, Rob van Schie has been a long-serving member on the Executive. Together with his wife, Noeline, this is their story.



I also met Noeline at University where she was studying education.

We married in 1960, the year I started full-time work with the then State Forestry Commission. Noeline was already teaching. I spent my entire working life with Forestry Tasmania, including holidays during my five years at university, working all over Tasmania.

I had already joined TASS before I retired, but became an active member on that fateful day in 1992, when president Ron Darvell threatened to close down TASS, unless there were members willing to serve on the Executive. I volunteered to be secretary, and I have been on the Executive ever since. I might have been driven by the action of the Education Department when Noelene not only had to resign when she was expecting our first child, but was also handed back her superannuation contributions LESS administration costs.
